



1 Do you refer to a board certified oral surgeon?

Board certified oral surgeons receive 4–6 years of additional specialized training and provide services in offices specifically designed for oral surgery.

2 Will I have the opportunity to meet with my surgeon before the date of my procedure to review my health history and concerns?

For optimal safety and comfort you should have the opportunity to have a presurgical consultation with your surgeon to address any concerns you may have regarding your procedure and recovery.

3 Is your facility outfitted and inspected for surgical procedures?

Unlike a general dental office, oral surgery offices are specifically designed to safely provide oral surgical services. Oral surgery offices must undergo office anesthesia evaluations every 5 years to maintain membership in the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons.

4 Will I have a follow-up with the surgeon after my procedure?

A reputable oral surgery office will have the ability to see you for a follow-up at any point in your recovery, as well as provide on-call services for after hour complications.

5 Are you able to provide any level of anesthesia I may need?

Oral surgeons are the only recognized ADA surgical specialist that by law can provide all levels of anesthesia to ensure optimal comfort and safety of all surgical procedures.
